



Peace Corner

Many remember the infamous words of Neville Chamberlain on September 30, 1938, announcing that he and Adolf Hitler had achieved “peace for our time.” World War II began eleven months later.

Lounges Set Aside for Pet Guests

Starting July 1 Timbercrest will have designated lounges for overnight guests who want their pets with them for their stay. Lounges that are “pet friendly” will be Lower I and L Wings. All other all other lounges will not be “pet friendly.” Also, there will be an additional fee of \$10 per night, per pet, per lounge. Please note when guests/residents are reserving lounges you will need to ask if they will be bringing a pet with them. This will assure we are offering them a correct lounge.

This change helps address concerns about pet dander and behavior that have occurred in guest lounges recently. The lounges appointed do not have air that circulates into the rest of the Manor and also have outside access.

Voting Records Update

The Indiana Election Division recently sent out many postcards to registered voters in order to help verify addresses and active voting status. Many, but not all, voters received these post cards.

To respond: if you received a card at an address where someone no longer lives (i.e., one of the Neighborhood Homes), simply write “No longer lives here” and return the card in the mail. If you live in the Timbercrest Manor and the postcard was forwarded from a previous address, see Brian Daniels or Wanda Miller, who can help you with a change of voter address form.

The Wabash County Clerk’s Office sends updated voter information to Program and Services every year, about two months before an election. This list includes everyone registered to vote in the coming election.

November 5 is the next election. It is local/municipal offices only. More information will be provided this fall.
