There are important deadlines for voting approaching in October.

- **Monday, October 5**, is the last day for new voters to register and changes of address.
- **Thursday, October 8**, early voting begins.
- **Wednesday, October 22**, is the last day to submit an application for an Absentee Ballot. It must be received at the county clerk's office on or before that date.

## 2020 Election Information

Absentee ballots have been arriving in resident mailboxes the last few weeks. There is a great spirit of “election fever” in the country as we head toward the Presidential Election.

The Wabash County Clerk has provided the most up-to-date list of registered voters who live on Timbercrest’s campus. If you have voted in *any* election in recent years, it is likely that you are registered to vote this fall. **New voter registration ends October 5.**

If you moved to Timbercrest recently, it would be a good idea to check to see if you are on the current list. If you moved from a Neighborhood Home to the Manor, it is good to check. Wanda Miller and Brian Daniels have copies of the list.

Timbercrest is not a voting site this fall due to coronavirus concerns. If you want to submit an absentee ballot, *you must request one* from the county clerk. Forms for absentee ballots are on the tables near the Dining Rooms and on the table in the Front Foyer until October 22. You can print your absentee-ballot request form at [www.indianavoters.in.gov](http://www.indianavoters.in.gov) Requests for absentee ballots *must be received* at the Wabash County Clerk’s Office, 69 W. Hill St., Wabash, Ind., 46992, by **October 22.**

Completed absentee *ballots* must be received in the clerk’s office by **Noon, Monday, November 2.**

In addition to absentee voting, voters may vote early at the Clerk’s Office, 69 W. Hill St., Wabash, beginning **October 8** at the following locations:

- Wabash County Clerk’s Office, 69 W. Hill St., Wabash (next to the courthouse), **8 a.m. to 4 p.m.** (except as noted):

### A Word about Politicking

As a non-profit charitable organization, any semblance of Timbercrest-sanctioned “politicking” is prohibited on campus. This includes political signs in lawns or landscaping, banners and flags endorsing candidates, etc.

It is important to know that political solicitation is also prohibited. Candidates and their representatives are not allowed to campaign on campus or in the Manor. Timbercrest will not organize or conduct political meetings. (Neighborhood Homes residents may have privately and personally invited gatherings in their homes, with no signage or other indications of a political meeting.)

Additionally, employees, volunteers and others are prohibited by the Timbercrest Code of Conduct from trying *in any way* to influence your vote. This includes discussions, literature distribution, election paraphernalia, asking for donations, etc. If you feel that an employee or non-resident is trying to influence your vote, contact Sabine Thomas, Christy Huiras or Brian Daniels as soon as possible.

Of course, political discussions between residents are not inhibited, but political proselytizing is discouraged.

Election Day is **November 3.** Voting sites are open **6 a.m. to 6 p.m.** that day. Local voting sites are:

- Town Life Center, 603 Bond St.
- North Manchester Library, 405 N. Market St.
- Laketon/Pleasant Twp. Fire Station, 10459 N. Ogden Rd., Laketon

If you vote in person, either early voting or on Election Day, you must provide the following:

- 1) A valid, government-issued photo ID (driver’s license, passport, state ID, veterans’ ID).
- 2) Manor residents should be sure that their ID lists their address as 2201 East St., North Manchester (not P.O. Box 501).
- 3) Expired no later than Nov. 6, 2018.

Due to Indiana State Department of Health regulations and the prospect of “restrictions” due to coronavirus, ***there will not be Timbercrest transportation to the polls***, either for early voting or on Election Day. The best option for Timbercrest residents to vote is by absentee ballot. Interested persons can organize personal carpools to an early voting site, but Timbercrest is unable to do this.



### Your Help, Please

There are several outside contractors on campus in the Manor and in the Neighborhood Homes. These workers are hired for specific jobs and usually work in other locations in addition to Timbercrest.

Some residents stop the contractors in the middle of their work and ask for work to be done. They are not Timbercrest employees and shouldn't be performing work our own Maintenance team should be doing.

All work requests for Maintenance should go through the Receptionist, 982-2118. Thanks for your help!

### Walmart Shopping



Walmart shopping is stepping back to normalcy. In September there will be only one shopping trip, **Thursday, October 8**. Residents can't ride along. Walmart shopping lists are due ***in Campus Mail only by Noon*** on October 8. Shopping will be completed Thursday evening for pick up Friday morning. You will be telephoned when the order is in. Here are guidelines for placing an order:

- 1) **You can now order produce, dairy and eggs**, but it is preferred to get these items through Neighborhood Fresh Market shopper on Tuesdays. Milk is sold in our Neighborhood Market in half-gallons.
- 2) **Be sure your note is clear:** sizes, quantities, etc. If you write "the largest bottle" of something, you will get the largest bottle, which may be larger than you expected.
- 3) There are still no returns. This is a *temporary* Walmart policy during the COVID-19 crisis, but it means when you place your order for Walmart through Timbercrest, you must give as many details as possible.
- 4) On your order, be sure to include a phone number where you can be reached.

Laura will preference resources that have been important to this community in their daily walk.

## Praying with Scripture: Lectio Divina

## From the Technology Users’ Group

---

### Monitor the Status of Your Absentee Ballot

The Technology Users’ Group (TUG) has provided a way – using technology – that voters can see the status of their absentee ballot application and absentee ballot using your computer. To do this, follow the steps listed:

- Use your web browser to go to the website: [www.indianavoters.in.gov](http://www.indianavoters.in.gov)
- Click the “Check Your Registration” button.
- Enter your first and last name, your birthdate, and choose Wabash county. Click “Submit.”
- Verify the information you entered is correct and click “Continue.”
- Click “Click Here to Proceed To Your Portal.”
  - Optionally, you can choose to set up two-factor authentication first, which is an enhanced security procedure described on the screen.
- You may need to scroll down to see your Absentee Ballot Information in a box on the left side of the screen. This box includes the dates your absentee ballot application was received, when your absentee ballot was mailed, and when it was received.

### Be Sure to Wear Your Mask

Be sure your mask covers both nose and mouth, fits snugly to the sides of your face and chin, and is secure with ties or ear loops. Please wear your mask outside of your home or when others come into your home. Disposable surgical masks should be changed about every three days. New masks are available at the

Receptionist or at the Residential Nurses Station. If you are leaving campus it is recommended to leave your surgical mask at home and to wear a cloth mask (if you have one) when shopping, at the doctor, etc.

## Timbercrest Film Committee Presents “Why No Films on Channel 2?”



Several people have wondered with our new programming on Channel 2, with the capacity to show videos of Chapel, EvenSong and other programs, why don't we show movies on Channel 2, also? If you happened to guess “Money,” you're partly correct. If you guessed “Copyright infringement,” you're more correct.

Timbercrest (and most places like us) pays a licensing fee in order to show films in public. The two or three films per month we regularly show are covered by this license. So are public programs shown in Health Care and Crestwood (like travelogues with Rick Steves, the Blue Planet series, Gaither Homecoming programs, etc.). As long as there is no admission charged and the primary audience is residents, the license covers 99% of all films.

However, a re-broadcast license is far more money and far more complicated. This is why we don't show major sports events (like the Super Bowl or Dayton 500) in the Assembly Room. It's why we can't rebroadcast things like the Presidential Debates or episodes of Rachel Ray. In addition to cost, when permission is available, each rebroadcast program requires documentation submitted.

Someone said, “I thought nursing homes were exempt from this.” Remember: Timbercrest is not a nursing home. It is a continuing care retirement community, a planned-living community. Only 20% of the people who live at Timbercrest are in nursing care. The other 80% are in various independent living options, from Residential to Neighborhood Homes.

Another said, “Who's going to know?” No one may ever know, but to Timbercrest it's a matter of integrity. We do our best to play by the rules, even when it's difficult. No one may find out... but we'd know.
