## Timbercrest History Project

Be part of Timbercrest history! Our long and storied past is filled with stories of the people who founded, built and lived at the Mexico Home and at Timbercrest. A compilation of those stories is found in the book *A Century of Service*, which can be found in the Timbercrest Library.

That book was published in 1989 on the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the old home, and the 21<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the move to North Manchester. It also marked what has been called “the big expansion,” with the additions of several wings, a new Health Care, the Assembly Room and A Street. It was an exciting time.

Needless to say, a lot has happened on campus since 1989. The last 30 years have seen more wonderful people living here, more growth of the campus and changes to keep up with the times. There have been notable characters who’ve made Timbercrest their home.

A project is underway to update *A Century of Service*, to republish the original content with additional stories from the past 30 years. The new book will have a new name, also. The project is expected to take 2-3 years.

## Timbercrest Film Committee Presents October Films

When director Kasi Lemmons started work on the first major movie about Harriet Tubman, the 19<sup>th</sup> century slave turned hero of the Underground Railroad, she decided to focus less on the brutality of slavery and more on human stories.

“I really felt that I wanted to speak about a different kind of violence, family separation, which I hadn’t seen as much of but is very much the Harriet Tubman story and what she was motivated by,” said Lemmons, co-writer of the screenplay. “The image of her sisters being taken away, her brother having to leave his wife right after childbirth, her sister saying ‘No, I can’t leave my children.’ The choices that people had to make and the fact that she was motivated to go back to rescue her family.”

Tubman was born into slavery in the early 1800s in Maryland. As a young adult, she escaped slavery by running nearly 100 miles through forests and fields. She then risked her life several times to return to Maryland and lead dozens of slaves to freedom via the Underground Railroad.

A semi-fictionalized account of the Tuskegee Airmen, the first all-African-American Air Force squadron during World War II, the film centers on ambitious young pilot Hannibal Lee (Laurence Fishburne). Despite initial reticence by higher ranking white officers, Lee, along with Walter Peoples, Leroy Cappy and others, are deployed into combat. As the successful missions mount, the Tuskegee Airmen develop a reputation as an able, fearsome group of pilots.



## Peace Corner: Peace in the World

*Adapted from The Peace Book by Louise Diamond*

As we are forced to look so often at our own dilemma at Timbercrest regarding Covid and shut-downs and changes and visitation and the tumultuous changing American society, Louise Diamond recommends the following to help world peace...

- **Take an interest in world affairs.** Read, watch and learn from a variety of sources.
- **Choose a particular issue of interest** and follow that rather than being overwhelmed by the whole world's trouble: famine, water, ethnic strife, education, small arms sales, etc.
- **Adopt one place in the world (outside the U.S.) as a place of your special concern.** Learn all you can. Find a reliable pen pal in that country through a church or missions connection. Find a charity or agency that works in that place and help them. Host a party of meeting to inform others about the place you've adopted.
- **Let the suffering of the world move you.** Be realistic about the needs of others and compassionate. Do what you can to alleviate that need. Often small things mean a lot (Knit for Kids or glasses/sunglasses for El Salvador are wonderful gifts for people worldwide.)
- **Support organizations and agencies working for world peace.** Many large agencies work in broad ways around the world. Others focus on specific needs. Check with your denomination or other charities for what may suit you.
- **Get to know internationals living locally.** Whether it be students at local high schools or M.U. or immigrant families in this area, find ways to socialize and bring them into your life.
