CONSIDER...

15 consecutive years falls have been most common injury-related cause for hospitalization at Westchester Medical Center, the Hudson Valley's Level I adult/pediatric trauma center

1 in 5 falls result in serious injury, such as a fracture



33% of falls for people 65+ result in a traumatic injury

75% of falls occur in the home

Thursday, September 21, at 7:00 p.m. we will again venture to the Honeywell House in Wabash to learn about Indiana Landmarks and Wabash County.

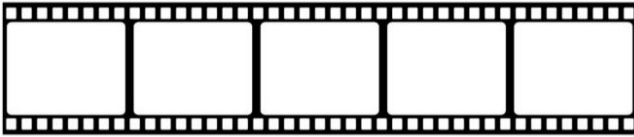

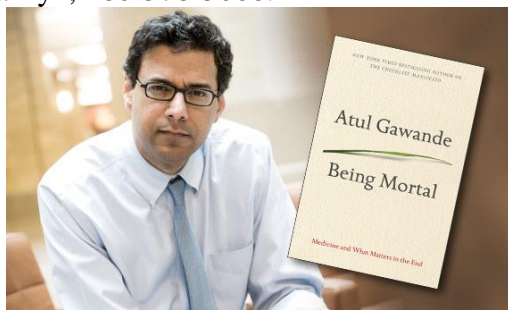
Book Club: *Being Mortal*

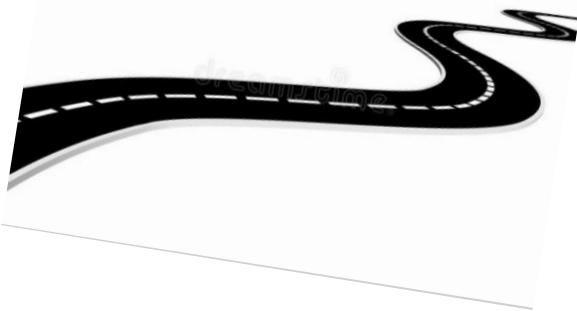

Words from The Basement

Today we have many electronic devices in our lives that we take for granted. Items such as laptop or desktop computers, televisions, Wi-Fi routers and TV cable boxes

are among the few. These devices may become an anonymous piece of furniture.

Recently I was asked per the dangers of covering up electrical equipment such as Metronet boxes with piles of papers. Covering these boxes is not an immediate danger; however, I will explain why we should keep them uncovered.

Every electrical appliance, whether a TV box, laptop computer or a microwave, generates heat. Some generate more heat than others. The heat which is generated must be dissipated, usually through convection, or to air which exits the device. The important issue is how much heat can a device generate and to what level. A stove, for instance, generates enough heat to burn what is in or near it as I have found while baking cookies. Now a TV box generates a lesser amount, that which is well below the level needed to start combustion or burning of paper.

But, even if the device cannot generate enough heat to start combustion in normal operation, covering up the device is still not good for it. Nearly all electrical equipment now contains tiny computers. Computers are simply electrical circuits which can be affected by extreme temperatures. Our computers, TV boxes and TVs need airflow for heat dissipate to keep the circuit running properly. When we cover up devices, we can restrict the airflow that the device needs. Along with reduced airflow, we have an insulation factor which will also increase the heat within the device. A device's life can be shortened when run under high heat conditions.

So, now that we know most devices don't generate enough heat under normal operation, are there any other dangers? Yes! Electrical circuits can fail, ending with possible sparks. And sparks are hot enough to start combustion. It is for this reason we

must keep combustibles away from our devices and appliances, especially stoves and ovens, toasters, clothes dryers, etc.

So, how much clearance is needed? First, we should never let any combustible such as newspaper contact an appliance. Our living spaces are already set with safe levels of space around major appliances. Our job is to assure we do not stack combustibles on or near electrical appliances and devices. Storing excessive amounts of combustibles such as newspapers, even away from appliance, is not advised as it is fuel for fire.

A piece of advice for all of us is to occasionally clean off the exterior vents of our devices. A simple wipe or dusting can be sufficient. This easy-to-do act can help extend the life of the devices we depend on in our daily lives.
